# Laity

The opportunities to grow and lead as a lay person in your congregation or district are varied.

Lay Servants Assist the clergy in leading inside your local church

Lay Speakers Preach in your local church and around your district

**Certified Lay Ministers** Assist the District Superintendent in serving wherever district church(es)

require assistance. This can be for: Youth Leaders, Evangelism Teams, Pastoral Care Givers, Community Leaders, Worship Leaders, Small Group Leaders and, Lay Supply (laity leading congregations that do not have an

appointed clergyperson)

If you believe your call is to work within your specific church or district, you may be called to continue growing as a lay person. Lay Servants, Lay Speakers, and Certified Lay Ministers are all under the care of the Board of Laity. Talk to your district lay leader.

# Clergy

Serving as clergy, you can be a licensed local pastor (LLP) or be ordained. The two distinct orders of ordained clergy are elders, whose primary focus is to oversee the life of the church, and deacons, whose primary focus is to be in touch with the needs of the community and connect the church to those places. All clergy have both common ground and distinctions.

- Send an email to your District Superintendent and copy the Chair of your District Committee on Ordained Ministry (dCOM).
- Describe your call and your intent toward vocational ministry, asking to be admitted to the candidacy program.

# Admitted Candidate: Continued Exploration

Once you are an admitted candidate, by recommendation of your dCOM during the Admission Interview, you will be placed on two new tracks:

The remaining steps are passive, use as a record of

the date the step was completed.

Your dCOM chair will receive a copy of your application automatically and schedule you for an interview.

<sup>\*</sup>You will meet with the dCOM to be admitted to the candidacy studies program *before* you meet with your local S/PPRC or charge conference for their recommendation of your candidacy.

# **Certified Candidate: Candidates for Ministry**

Certification can lead in three directions: Toward ordained deacon, ordained elder or local pastor. Each requires continuing education: seminary for Elder/Deacon and Course of Study for LLP.

#### **Licensed Local Pastor**

#### Order of Elder

# Things to remember for Certified Candidates:

#### **Annual Renewal of Status**

Certified Candidates and LLP's must renew their status with the dCOM annually to review growth

### **Seminary and Course of Study Scholarships**

Scholarships are available for certified candidates and LLP's attending United Methodist seminaries or University Senate approved seminaries (www.gbhem.org).

# Consider a Long Term Career as an Ordained Clergy Person in the UMC

During the last year of seminary, candidates can apply for Provisional Membership.

### **Licensed Local Pastor**

In order to become a Licensed Local Pastor (LLP):

- You will need to complete additional steps to become a Licensed Local Pastor: https://vaumc.org/clergyexcellence-candidacyforms
- Then interview with the dCOM once these steps are complete.

Contact your dCOM Chair and see if completing the forms and application are right for your process. You may work these steps simultaneously with the steps to Becoming a Certified Candidate; however, you must receive a positive recommendation as a certified candidate before you may be recommended for licensing. Certification and Recommendation for Licensing can take place at the same dCOM interview but not always.

# **Licensing as a Local Pastor Steps**

Create a sermon outline and manuscript Record yourself preaching the sermon Complete the Written Responses Interview with dCOM Attend Licensing School in May

# Associate Membership: A permanent conference relationship for Licensed Local Pastors

Licensed Local Pastors have the option to apply for Associate Membership once they have completed a series of requirements which include: reaching the age of forty, maintaining their conference relationship for four years, and completing their Course of Study. Associate Membership is a permanent status which allows LLP's to forego annual examination, and enables them to retain their license in retirement.

# **Pursuing Ordination: Provisional Journey**

#### **Expectations and Examinations**

Candidates who are licensed in the Virginia conference, and have a Master of Divinity from an accredited United Methodist seminary, may request an application packet which includes a calendar of deadlines for papers which must be submitted to the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Topics include: 1) Theology, 2) Practice of Ministry, 3) Vocation and Leadership, 4) Call

Candidates are then interviewed by the corresponding committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Candidates can be approved to progress to the next level in the process or can be continued and required to return for repeat examination in any given subject.

After their application is submitted, candidates receive detailed instructions on the required content for these papers. Clergy Excellence provides a list of informal advisors from the VAUMC who are able to read papers and offer feedback, as well as help with preparation.

The provisional process can take anywhere from 3 to 8 years.

#### **Mentor-Covenant Groups**

Provide provisional candidates the opportunity to build a relationship with a clergy mentor and a group of your peers that will assist in developing vocational identity, reflecting theologically on the practice of ministry, and reviewing the exercise of authority and power in a new clergy role using Ministry Reflection Reports. Covenant groups convene for the first time during a two-day retreat at the beginning of your first year, and your Mentor-Covenant Group will meet monthly from then forward, except for the summer months (May through August).

### **Provisional Residency Events**

Residency Events are designed to support habits, attitudes, and practices of theological study and covenant life that will influence your entire ministry. Each Residency Event will focus on a different theme related to the life of the church. The Residency Events are held on a Tuesday through Wednesday in July and in September, annually. Your whole class group will meet for connection and support during these events, as well as continuing theological education.

# **Supervision Ministry**

Provisional Deacons and Elders have a relationship with their District Superintendent as well as their S/PPRC or supervisory board/managers. These persons' feedback and support is important to vocational development, and the Provisional Membership Team of the Board is interested in their input. Five specific purposes have been identified for the supervisory role in your Provisional Journey:

- a) to develop vocational identity
- b) to build effective ministry
- c) to enhance faith and theological understanding
- d) to experience support and accountability
- e) to receive feedback for use in making decisions of self-awareness
