As the church, it is imperative to acknowledge this work, support creatives and follow copyright laws of the United States.

As such, local churches need to ensure they are giving proper credit in all their print and online communications and also ensure any music, music lyrics, videos, or motion pictures shown in person, over livestream or recorded are licensed to be shown.


While many ministries and local churches may feel protected under the Religious Service Exemption in American copyright law, this exemption does not apply to a broadcast of a religious service, including online streaming. This means that you need a performance license for both live and recorded audio.



Before livestreaming worship, be sure that you have all the proper copyrights in place. This includes making sure you are allowed to play a particular song, show music lyrics, print out musical scores or stream any worship service. Some Available Streaming Licensing Services:



Churches are known for skirting licensing and as such they risk being caught. When you buy or rent a movie, it is for personal use (i.e. at your home for family and friends). When you show a movie outside of your home, it constitutes a public performance. A public performance means you need to obtain a license and abide by the license agreement as you have a legal agreement to uphold.

There are purposes for which organizations can claim fair use which include education, scholarship, and research. However, churches do not usually fall into these categories as churches are not showing movies at their facilities for reasons falling under the fair use parameters.

On the next pages are some companies that will work with you to discuss your needs and get the proper license. By doing so, you are doing the right thing and setting a good example for your faith community that copyrights should be upheld and creatives should be compensated when their products are used.



• Swank Motion Pictures https://www.swank.com/

Ideal for a planned and scheduled single movie event. The advantage of a license like this is you have the flexibility to show and promote your event (i.e. indoor, outdoor, public invitation, and even charging admission). Swank also has ready-made promotional templates such as posters.

This licensing company is ideal for showing films produced by 20th Century Fox. They have other productions as well. Similar to Swank, Criterion offers one-time licenses per movie, per show. Custom promotional materials are available.



• Church Video Licensing (CVL) https://us.cvli.com/

This licensing option has been specifically designed for churches offering an annual 'umbrella' license that allows you to show movies at church throughout the year. They also have a one-week option. You do need to make sure that CVL covers your desired movie, and there are restrictions about promotion and viewing location. Overall, this license is intended for showing movies on church property to members of the congregation and their guests. As a bonus, CVL offers ScreenVue, which has movie clips to use as teasers or in sermons. CVL is a division of Motion Picture Licensing Corporation (MPLC).

• Movie Licensing USA

This licensing group is specifically tailored and priced for public libraries, as well as K-12 schools. Movie Licensing USA is a division of Swank Motion Pictures.
