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Bishop calls for stronger discipleship

n Friday, June 19, after organizing the Annual Conference and conducting balloting for General and jurisdictional conference delegates, Bishop Young Jin Cho delivered his Episcopal Address to laity and clergy gathered inside the Berglund Coliseum.

Bishop Cho admitted that the conference year had not been an easy one. In his words, it had been filled with "challenges, conflicts and struggles."

He said he has emphasized four areas of focus since beginning as bishop three years ago. These included leading All Things New-Equipping Vital Congregations (ATN-EVC), strengthening the spiritual foundation of our mission and ministries, developing new faith communities and nurturing a culture of cooperation and coordination.

An important accomplishment during the conference year was the conference-wide conversation on human sexuality held last Nov. 22. Differences were shared at this meeting

organized by the Task Force team and Common Table.

Although, Bishop Cho said, not everyone was happy about the conversation, strides were taken toward "a holy conversation on this divisive issue." He noted that the 2016 General Conference will be crucial for the future of The United Methodist

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Church in deciding this issue.
But, while in the midst
of conferencing and discussions, Bishop Cho urged that
the church not forget that
our mission is making dis-

ciples of Jesus Christ for the

transformation of our world.


This was the reason he chose the theme "From Members to Disciples" for the 2015 Annual Conference. "Growing from members to disciples is the most important change we need today," said Bishop Cho.

In the next several months, he said, the church will need to think about and define the meaning of "disciples." And one of the questions that will need to be asked is, "How do we make disciples of Jesus Christ?"

This question represents much more than just a question, Bishop Cho said. He urged the church to wrestle with the theme as it will also be the theme for the 2015 charge conferences as a means to address challenges facing the church.

"We are called to be more than conquerors. Crisis is dangerous, but in Christ crisis will be an opportunity," he said, helping both clergy and laity to be open more to God and to change.

Bishop Cho ended by urging the power of prayer and the effect it can have for the church. "Prayer changes the situation we face, but most of all, prayer changes ourselves." he said.



Voting Results:



ev. Young Bong Kim reflected on death for the Service of Remembrance and Holy Communion on Friday night. But death as a celebration—the Christian belief that to die means life. He stated that though our loved ones pass, we are still connected to them spiritually on the same sphere. "Death has no place in God's Kingdom. I earnestly pray that the Holy Spirit may touch our hearts to broaden our visions so we can see the

world beyond our time and space," said Rev. Kim.

The service included the naming of Virginia Conference clergy and laity who died since the last Annual Conference as well as Holy Communion by intinction and songs from "Here I am, Lord" to "Revelation Song," a song that reminds us that though Jesus was slain on the cross. death was not the end.
