## **History of Christian Thought:**

*The First 1,000 Years: A Global History of Christianity* by Robert Lewis Wilken An incredibly thorough, yet very accessible survey of the development of historic Christian theology and thought.

## The Spirit of Early Christian Thought by Robert Lewis Wilken

Slightly more demanding than *The First 1,000 Years*, this book charts the development of Christian Thought through the 7 ecumenical councils of the Church.

*The Story of Christianity vols.* 1&2 by Justo L. Gonzalez This is a thorough, yet readable, survey of Christian history told over two parts.

# "The Primary Sources":

On the Incarnation by St. Athanasius This is Christology 101.

## Confessions by St. Augustine

Augustine weaves his mature theology into his own spiritual memoir and his journey of faith.

# Dogmatics in Outline by Karl Barth

A bit challenging, but will give you a brief, yet robust, modern systematic theology. Other quick reads by Karl Barth, the greatest modern theologian, would be "Strange New World Within the Bible" by Karl Barth found in *The Word of God and the Word of Man*, "Protestant Theology in the 19th Century" by Karl Barth found in *The Humanity of God*, and *The Epistle to the Romans*.

# Modern Issues in Theology:

# She Who Is by Elizabeth Johnson

Elizabeth Johnson is a Roman Catholic theologian who wrote a book arguing for the use of feminine pronouns with respect to God and *didn't* get excommunicated for her work; so you know she gets her classic Trinitarian theology right!

#### The Cross and the Lynching Tree by James Cone

James Cone is a disciple of Karl Barh who seeks to apply Christology and a christocentric soteriology to racial history in the American South.

#### The Christian Imagination: Theology and the Origins of Race by Willie James Jennings

Full disclosure: this book is as challenging as they come. However, an enterprising reader will find here a theological account of racialization as well as applying doctrines of soteriology, eschatology, and ecclesiology to a racialized American church.

#### The Creed by Luke Timothy Johnson

Very good meditation on the Apostle's Creed, the theology found within the Creed and its place within the life of the Church today.

# The Divine Name(s) and the Holy Trinity by Kendall Soulen

Soulen does a wonderful job here of providing a survey of different ways to name the Trinity and provides categorizations for thinking about how different ways of naming function within Christian thought and the life of the church.

#### Jesus, Humanity, and the Trinity: A Brief Systematic Theology by Kathryn Tanner

A brief, yet robust, attempt at a Christocentric systematic theology that sees God as the giver of all good gifts.

#### Resident Aliens by Stanley Hauerwas and William H Willimon

A modern bombshell of a book that calls the church back to its original calling: to witness to the world what God has done in Jesus Christ.

# *With the Grain of the Universe: The Church's Witness and Natural Theology* by Stanley Hauerwas

Hauerwas builds and offers a Christocentric natural theology.

## *Responsible Grace* by Randy Maddox Simply put, the gold standard for a systematic understanding of Wesleyan theology.

*Wesley and the People Called Methodists* by Richard P. Heitzenrater The history of the Methodist movement.

*The Elusive Mr. Wesley* by Richard P. Heitzenrater An attempt to sketch a 360 degree picture of John Wesley

#### Practical Divinity: Theology in the Wesleyan Tradition An excellent survey of the development of Wesleyan theology from Wesley to today.
