Pub Theology was held at Bull Island Brewing Company in Hampton as a part of pre-Annual Conference events on Thursday, June 15. Pub Theology has been a pre-conference activity for the last two Annual Conferences, beginning in Roanoke in 2015.

The men behind Crackers and Grape Juice podcast, the Rev. Jason Micheli, the Rev. Teer Hardy, the Rev. Taylor Mertins and the Rev. Morgan Guyton, hosted the event with special guest Dr. Jeffrey Pugh to talk about what it means to be a Christian in

the current political climate with over 60 people in attendance. The evening began with music by Clay Mottley followed by the panel launching into a discussion about ideologies and how they play into our religious and secular lives.

The Gospel spoke a different truth

Pugh's recent book, Religiousless Christianity, tackles the work of Dietrich Bonhoeffer in World War II-era Germany. Pugh noted that while many are likening the current climate to 1944 Germany, 2017 America is not 1944 Germany. However, Pugh suggested that Bonhoeffer's work can still be applied to our current state of affairs. He noted that to Bonhoeffer, "The Gospel spoke a different truth than the culture." While our country "is certainly not perfect," he said that he wouldn't want to see the United States culture collapse as 1944 Germany.

affiliations and ideologies. He said that we need to hold everyone accountable, regardless of political party.

"Political structures," he said, "are by and large incapable of mercy and grace." He asserted that we live in an era where lies and truth are held with the same amount of validity.

"The lie has become an army of Orcs seeking to destroy the truth," he said. This J.R.R. Tolkien-related comment had the room smiling at his nerdy, but also poignant, reference.

The concept of justification

The group also discussed the concept of justification and how it applied to one's life. Pugh once again drew from Bonhoeffer and said that justification meant being put on a path of overflowing love. The Rev. Morgan Guyton said that, to him, "Justification means I have the freedom to be wrong." By extension, Guyton said that meant that he has the freedom to be malleable and to change.

On June 16, in Ballroom B of the Hampton Roads Convention Center from 10 to 11 a.m., the Rev. Tom Berlin, a Virginia Conference

elder who is serving on the Commission on a Way Forward, will provide a report on the work of the commission. His report will include what to anticipate as United Methodists move toward the called General Conference in 2019. Berlin will discuss why marriage and ordination of LGBTO persons is such an important and challenging matter in the life of the United Methodist Church. He will provide ways for pastors and laity to begin to prepare for the General Conference in their churches. Opportunity will be given to ask questions and consider the work of the commission. Berlin will also give a 20-minute presentation on Saturday June 17 in the afternoon that will be livestreamed and recorded for later use.
